Course Description:

In this course you will learn basic geologic principles and how they apply to Florida and the environment around you. While the best and ideal way to learn geology is hands on, this semester the class if offered all online in response to current events. This course will have one weekly lecture and a corresponding assignment to help you understand and implement the geologic principles you have learned in lecture. There will be quizzes and a final presentation.

Attendance:

Attendance is MANDATORY. While this is an online class, attendance to the Zoom lectures is mandatory and will be used to determine your participation grade. If you know you are going to be absent, please contact me ahead of time. If you are sick or there is an emergency that prevents you from attending class, please email me as soon as possible with proper documentation.

Lectures:

Lectures will be live on Zoom during your designated class time. Attendance will be taken during the live lectures. The PowerPoints and class lab assignments will be uploaded to canvas prior to each class and can be found in the module on Canvas.

Assignments:

There will be weekly lab assignments that will correspond to the lecture material. You have one week to complete them.

There will be four quizzes covering the material presented in the lecture. The quiz will be posted on Canvas and will be due one week from date the assigned date. There will be one make-up quiz at the end of the semester that you could use to replace a missed quiz or your lowest quiz grade.

There will be one final presentation for this class that you will present at the end of the semester. I will post the rubric and suggested topics later into the semester. The presentation needs to be 5-

10 slides on your chosen topic. You will need to record yourself giving the presentation or attach audio to each slide and submit it to Canvas.
