Professional Geology

<u>Catalog listing:</u> Survey of topics and skills relevant to modern geoscience careers and professional geology certifications.

About the course: This course explores how geologic principles are applied in mining, environmental remediation, water resources, land management, alternative energy, space and other in-demand geoscience careers. A significant portion of the course will be focused on preparing for professional certification exams.

We will also build your professional toolkit for success in industry by learning from geo-professionals from a variety of geoscience careers and course content including geo-ethics and responsible / sustainable resource development, resume and interview skills, exploring the use of technology in industry and more.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLO):

- 1. Identify and apply the basic scientific concepts and terminology of various geologic industries.
- 2. Explore geoscience career paths in a variety of geology-based jobs in industry.
- 3. Discuss the complexities of topics of geo-ethics and sustainable resource development.
- 4. Strengthen career "soft skills" such as resumes, interviewing and communication.

COURSE DETAILS

Prerequisites and Course Information: 3 credit hours. Prerequisite is three previous geoscience courses or instructor permission. This course is intended for geoscience majors, and student are expected to start the course with knowledge of basic geologic terminology and principles is expected.

Format: This course is offered in a hybrid format to enable both on-campus and UF Online students to participate.

Materials & Supplies: There is no Supply Fee associated with this course. You will need a way to keep notes in class. Paper notebooks, tablets or laptops are all good options, whatever works best for you. PowerPoint files for lectures will be posted before class starts on the class Canvas page to aid in note-taking. Any other needed materials will be provided. We will be creating our own flashcards and quiz materials for the exam prep portion of the course, note cards will be provided, but if you are particular about your note cards, feel free to bring your own.

A Canvas page for each week lists everything you need to read and do to be prepared for class on Friday. These pages are ready at least a week in advance of any due dates. Lecture slides will also be added to the page before class if you need them for note-taking purposes.

YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

- Read each week's webpage on Canvas to understand what you need to do each week.
- Check the announcements on Canvas and your e-mail regularly it is the only way I can directly communicate with you outside of class.
- Complete course assignments and activities in a timely fashion.
- Attend and participate in class to the best of your ability. For on campus students, that means attending class in person. For online students, please work our a participation plan with the instructor if you can't attend synchronously.

COURSE DELIVERABLES

Each deliverable will be graded, but your goal is progress, not perfection. It's ok if you struggle with assignments – we will be working on challenging material. Your final grade will consider evidence of positive progress over the semester. You will be allowed to revise and resubmit when it is beneficial for your learning and time allows. I want everyone to succeed in this course!

Prep Work: Each week, you will need to complete a small online activity that encourages you to keep up with assigned materials so you are prepared for class. This can take the form of a short quiz or written summary. Prep Work will be due on Friday at 11:00 am EST each week. This will give me a chance to see how everyone did before class starts. Each quiz is worth 20 points. Your lowest quiz grade will be dropped, even if it's a zero/missing. Prep Work is worth 25% of your overall grade.

Assignments: Assignments are any activities completed outside of class time. Each assignment is worth 20 points and the lowest Assignment grade is dropped, even if it is a zero/missing. Assignments count for 20% of your overall grade.

In-class Activities: Each week we will be working on something in class. From discussions to games to sharpen our geology knowledge, or activities lead by our guest instructors, each week will have a deliverable to be completed during class. Activities will be designed in such a way as to enable our virtual students to participate with the class. In-class activities are worth 20 points each, lowest grade will be

dropped. For Online students that can't participate in real time, we will work out a plan for when and how to turn in these deliverables. Activities count for 25% of your total grade.

Mock FG Exam or Final Project: For your cumulative assessment in this course, you will have two options, either is worth 25% of your overall grade:

- 1. Take a mock version of the FG exam (yes, the full 4-hour slog). Your grade will not be based on your test grade, but on your self- evaluation of your performance conducted after. Where did you do well? What do you need to work on? What is your game-plan to get you where you need to be? I will provide a detailed rubric to aid in this self-evaluation process.
- 2. If you really don't want to take the mock Exam, you may write a research paper, on a current and important topic in Economic or Professional Geology. You will need to develop your topic and have it approved by me around the mid-point of the course. This will be more robust than a typical term paper and will require you to interact with a professional working geologist for some of the content. You will build this over the second part of the semester (instead of turning it in all at once at the end). Detailed guidance on steps and expectations will be provided.

Participation: Weekly attendance and participation is expected. Just as in a professional work setting, you cannot simply skip class. If you are sick or need to miss class for other reasons, you must proactively inform your instructor and take responsibility for catching up on what you missed. You will be expected to engage in class discussions and activities and ask questions for the guest instructors. We are practicing the collaboration and collegiality that makes for a successful and enjoyable workplace. For online students who may be participating asynchronously, you will to work with me early in the course to define what weekly participation looks like for you. Participation is worth 5% of your total grade
